## SENSE OF THE BOARD RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING POLISH PEOPLE AS THEY COMMEMORATE THE 226<sup>nd</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF THE ADOPTION OF POLAND'S FIRST CONSTITUTION

**WHEREAS**, on May 1, 2017 Polish people in Stamford will celebrate the 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the adoption of the first Polish constitution; and

**WHEREAS**, American Revolutionary War hero Thaddeus Kosciuszko introduced the concept of constitutional democracy to his native country of Poland; and

**WHEREAS**, the Polish constitution of 1791 was the first liberal constitution in Europe and was designed to protect Poland's sovereignty and national unity and to create a progressive constitutional monarchy; and

**WHEREAS**, this Polish constitution was the first constitution in Central Eastern Europe to secure individual and religious freedom for all persons in Poland; and

**WHEREAS**, this Polish constitution formed a government composed of distinct legislative, executive, and judicial powers; and

**WHEREAS**, this Polish constitution declared that "all power in civil society should be derived from the will of the people"; and

**WHEREAS**, although this Polish constitution was in effect for less than 2 years, its principles endured and it became the symbol around which a powerful new national consciousness was born, helping Poland to survive long periods of misfortune over the following two centuries.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the 29th Board of Representatives goes on official record congratulating Polish people in Stamford including Americans of Polish descent, as on May 1, 2017 they commemorate the 226<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the adoption of the first Polish constitution, and recognize Poland's rebirth as a free and independent nation in the spirit of the legacy of the Polish constitution of 1791.
